

Shels players among game's quickest goals over 125 years

he records concerning the fastest goals are often disputed for a number of reasons. The Association of Football Statisticians has argued that as there is no official system for recognising the timing of goals as there are always going to be disputes concerning these records.

However, there is no disputing the fastest goal scored in Premier League history. That honour belongs to Republic of Ireland striker Shane Long when he scored after 7.69 seconds in a league game for his club Southampton against Watford played in April 2019

Long's goal came straight after the Hornets kicked off when he blocked a Craig Cathcart clearance before lifting the ball over Ben Foster in the Watford goal. It was a real morale booster for Shane Long who was up to then having a wretched time in front of goal. However, sadly for Long, the Saints could not build on the early goal and were pegged back with a late equaliser from Watford. Shane's goal beats Ledley King's record of 10 seconds for Tottenham against Bradford in 2000.

Here at home, Shelbourne were involved in four games with four of the fastest goals in the history of League of Ireland, two in the late fifties and two in the new millennium.

The first was on Wednesday 15 October 1958 when Shelbourne beat Drums by 4-3 after a flying start. They scored the quickest goal of the season in one of the best games in the Shield competition witnessed at Tolka Park. Shels were the away team. The crowd had plenty to cheer about, in a game played in lashing rain and icy cold conditions.

The first goal was a result of a touch Mick McElroy to Christy Doyle, a sharp burst through the unsettled Drums defence and a flick for McElroy to run on to the ball and shoot past the advancing Swan. In ten seconds the Reds were in the lead and two further goals from Doyle put the Reds into a 3-0 lead by the 17 minute. Drums pulled two back but McElroy added a fourth early in the second half.

Drums got their third goal fiften minutes.

Drums got their third goal fifteen minutes from the end but Shels held out to win the two points. Reports say both defences were not great but the public was thoroughly entertained. McElroy was signed from non Aer Lingus and played just one season with Shels. After he left us he had spells with Dundalk, Drogheda and Cork Hibernians. In his time with Shels he scored eight goals, three in the Shield, one in the LSC and four in the League. He will be remembered as having the unique distinction of scoring one, if not, the fastest goal in the club's history. The Shelbourne line out was:- Farmer, Byrne,O'Brien,Dunne,Fitzpatrick,Kelly,Conroy,Doyle,McElroy Hennessy and Cassidy

roy, Hennessy and Cassidy.
On the 14 April 1959 Shelbourne finished their league programme on a high note, beating St. Patrick's Athletic 5-2 with a hat-trick from Christy Doyle and two from Jackie Kelly, both penalties.

From the kick-off, Carroll worked the ball through before putting Doyle in to score after 15 seconds without a St.Pat's player touching the ball. The match report recorded that 16-year-old minor star, Carroll, at inside right looks promising. Carroll put Doyle through for the second, Kelly's penalties, came just before and after the break, and Doyle completed his hat-trick in the second half.

In goal for St.Patrick's that evening was

John Heavey. He joined the Reds in 1961 and replaced Finbarr Flood in goal. John would play an important part in helping Shels win the League in 1962 and the FAI Cup in 1963. He made over 80 League and FAI Cup appearances between 1961 to 1965. The Shels line-out that evening was:-Cahill, Murphy, Kearns, Dunne, Strahan, Kelly, Wilson, Carroll, Doyle, Hennessy, Conroy. Apart from the first three names on the team sheet and Carroll the other seven players helped Shels win the 1960 FAI Cup for the second time with a 2-0 victory over Cork Hibernians. Scorers:- Wilson and Barber.

Shelbourne welcomed Cobh Ramblers to Tolka Park for a First Division game on 26 June 2007. This was Shels' first season in Division 1 following demotion in 2006. The game got off to a flying start with a Shels player scoring after just 9 seconds. Unfortunately for the Reds right full Aaron McEniff turned a right wing cross from a Ramblers player into his own net. The game finished in a 2-2 draw with the Shelbourne's goals coming from Mark Leech and James Chambers for a deserved share of the points. On the 11 May 2012 Shels travelled to the UCD Bowl for a Premier Division fixture against our bogey side UCD.

This was Shels first season back in the Premier Division following demotion in 2006. The Reds got off to dream start with Philip Gorman turning in a Paddy Kavanagh cross after just fifteen seconds. Then disaster struck, Shels Sean Byrne was shown a straight red card and would play the next 77 minutes with ten men.

However, the Reds showed real resolve and a second goal from David Cassidy in the 65th minute gave us a 2-0 victory and three valuable points.

Grabbing his 100th goal in the League of Ireland last Friday, Shels striker Ciaran Kilduff says "you couldn't really have scriptéd it.'

Kilduff scored an 87th minute winner on Frday night to hand the Reds a priceless 1-0

win in Turner's Cross.

"Winning the First Division last year and having a night like we had as a group on Friday night, it was special," the striker told extratime.ie.

"Obviously being a striker, to get the goal was great but it meant a lot to a lot of people and none more so than me," he

towards the end of last year and was delighted to make his mark on Friday.

'As a person who's given their life to the League of Ireland, there's a couple of landmarks you want to hit and one is 100 league goals as

'That's something that I wanted to do that you don't think about it on the pitch, but when is a great feeling when it happens," he added. Killer said he got a kick in the head for his troubles in the pro-

cess, but said scoring was "totally worth it.

However, more pressingly, the 100 goal man said "we were worth our win down there" and the "stats

backed it up."

Looking to the season ahead, he said the squad and staff are "very ambitious and enthusiastic" who will be looking to win every game, not looking for draws.

He said he is firmly of the belief that "Shelbourne are a sleeping

giant of Irish football.

"We've the Champions coming to Tolka on Friday and we realize the task ahead of us but we will take one game at a time.

"It will be a great occasion on Friday and we're going to enjoy it for what it is and try and get a good result," he said.

The Reds back with a bang in Cork

Well, what a start that was. When Ciarán Kilduff nodded in the winner in the dying minutes at Turner's Cross the celebrations felt like we'd been waiting over six years just for that moment.

A huge Shels crowd travelled down to Cork for our first game back in the top flight adding to an attendance of just under 4,000 and easily coming in as one of the largest contingents of travelling support Cork have seen in quite a while.

With three buses, some fans on the train and huge numbers travelling down in cars, the stewards had to open half of the next section before the match such were the Shels numbers which, conservatively judging by how many fit in a block and a half of the stand behind the goal, numbered at least 500.

Being held for a while after the game was one aspect of being back in the top flight that nobody missed but such is the price to pay when you're back in the big time.

With Finn Harps next up on a Monday night our numbers will undoubtedly be lower but given that the next long distance away (Sligo on March 21st) is on a Saturday, we'll hopefully continue what has been a stellar start to the season in terms of support.

How far away is it?

Our return to the Premier Division has given us two of our longest away trips in the first two away games after Cork last week with Monday night's trip coming in at 450km return or about three hours each way in a car.

What are the options for getting there?

Outside of driving there aren't many options for this one as no trains go to Donegal. There are also no direct bus routes as with Bus Eireann you have to switch in Lifford.

What's the best route?

From Dublin the quickest route by a long shot is to go through some of the North. Take the M1 and come off at junction 14 onto the N33 to heading towards Ardee. That road then leads you on to the N2 which will go all the way to the border before changing to the A5 when you cross and get to Aughnacloy. You continue on that road through Omagh until you turn left onto the Bellspark Road just before Sion Mills. Once you reach Clady turn left again onto the Urney Road just after the primary school and that road will take you back over the border and all the way into Ballybofey. The ground will be on your right just as get there so you don't have to drive into the town itself.

For parking there are a few options around. One is beside McElhinney's department store and another is at SuperValu. Finn Harps do ask away fan "There are still (bar) coaches and cars to park in the McElhinney's car park.

Cost of a ticket?

Adult: €14. Student/senior citizen: €12. Secondary school student: €5. Pri- **all within a five minute** mary school student: €3.

Where do away fans go?

Shels supporters will access the ground via Chestnut Road (beside Aldi) and we will have the gantry side of the ground while the stand and town end are reserved for home fans.

Anywhere decent for a pint?

Sadly it seems that the pub just up the road from Finn Park which you used to be allowed go to for a pint at half time is now closed. However, there are still options with Heeney's, Barrett's and Cheers all within a five minute walk up Navenny Street towards the Main Street.

The 2002 FAI Cup final, Garry Haylock and The Cat and Cage.... Friday night's trip to Drumcondra will bring back happy memories for Dundalk fans.

For many years, that sunny April afternoon at Tolka Park was the only joyful thing that supporters could cling onto. Relegation and seven long seasons in the wilderness of the first division meant sure of that. Eighteen years on, things have changed just a bit and Vinny Perth's Dundalk will head up the M1 as champions of Ireland and in search of a sixth title in seven seasons.

The foundations for this golden period were laid back in 2013 when Stephen Kenny's new-look side came from nowhere to finish as runners up behind St Patrick's Athletic. One of the mainstays of that team was Andy Boyle, a raw 21-year-old centre-back when Kenny signed him ahead of the campaign.

Before that, Boyle enjoyed two happy seasons at Tolka Park which saw the Reds win promotion and reach the 2011 FAI Cup final where they were beaten on penalties by Sligo Rovers in front of 21,662 people at the Aviva Stadium.

"I had two good years at Shelbourne and there are still people involved from when I was there," said Boyle. "Everybody at the club was great to me. It was a good time for me to go and play there. I was a young centre-back and it was a good club to go and try and achieve things."

Now 28, the Dubliner is looking forward to going back to his old stomping ground and he is hoping to make his mark, just as he did on his last visit in September 2013 when Dundalk ruthlessly dismantled the Reds 5-1 in an FAI Cup quarter-final tie that was over at half-time.

"I remember that game well," smiled Boyle. "I don't score too many times so that's why I remember it! I think everything went right for us that night and Kurtis Byrne scored an amazing goal from the halfway

line. He had that in his locker, Kurtis. He missed the easy ones and scored the spectacular ones! It feels like a long time ago now."

Since then, the clubs have met just once on the northside of Dublin - February 5th 2016 to be precise - when Patrick McEleney scored his first goal for Dundalk in a Leinster Senior Cup tie that was played on the day that former Derry City striker Mark Farren was laid to rest. For the record, Paddy Barrett scored Dundalk's second in a 2-0 win with a sumptuous volley.

A familiar face lies in wait for Boyle and co on Friday evening. Ciaran Kilduff, the hero of Dundalk's European run later that year, is expected to lead the line for Ian Morris' side and after scoring the winner against Cork City on the opening night of the season, he looks to be as sharp as ever.

"Killer is one of the best strikers in the league," said Boyle. "He showed that again with the goal against Cork in Turner's Cross. He's awkward to play against, he has that tall frame and he works hard and he's always been a fit boy so it won't be easy against him."

After their win in Cork, Boyle expects Tolka Park to be rocking for Shelbourne's first home game since winning promotion as Division One champions last year.

"It's a big bonus having them back in the Premier Division," he added. "They're a big club and they're well supported and it'll be no different on Friday night, especially as it's their first home game of the season. There'll be a real buzz about the place.

"Ian Morris has signed well and they have a lot of players with a wealth of Premier Division experience, lads who have been there and done that. When you add that to the players that won them promotion, it makes for a very good squad so it will be very interesting to see how they do.

"When Dundalk come to town it's everybody's cup final so we'll have to be well aware of that but it's our first away game of the season and I'm sure we'll bring a great crowd

Cup win in **1993**





When Shelbourne defeated Cork Hibernians in Dalymount Park to win the 1963 FAI Cup, their second in three years, nobody thought it would take 30 years for the Reds to lift Irish football's blue riband trophy again.

The intervening three decades saw one Leinster Senior Cup, a move from Tolka Park to Harold's Cross, and then back to Tolka. In the only FAI Cup Final that Shels reached in that period, they were infamously beaten by an amateur Home Farm side in 1975.

However, change was in the air around Dublin 3. Just 12

However, change was in the air around Dublin 3. Just 12 months earlier, Mick Neville's "for all the doubters" speech rang around Oriel Park as a 3-1 Reds victory secured the club's first league title since 1992. Just five years earlier, the club had been promoted from the First Division following the first of only two relegations in the club's history.

Ironically, Shels faced Dundalk in the 1993 FAI Cup Final. The same opponents as the provious year when the

nal. The same opponents as the previous year when the club's seventh championship was clinched. As the 1992/93 league season had not yet concluded by the time of the Cup Final was played, it was fittingly contested by the league champions of 1991 and 1992.

The match itself went down as a dull affair. A cold and windy May afternoon in Lansdowne Road dampened the league's showpiece affair. Greg Costello's diving header was the only goal in a typical, cagey Cup Final.

The Dundalk team on the day boasted some League of Ireland legends, too. Seasoned pros such as Alan O'Neill, Richie Purdy, Tom McNulty, Gino Lawless and Terry Eviston provided worthy opposition for a Shels team that included Neville, Mark Rutherford and Garry Haylock.

Mick Neville, who captained the Reds from 1990-98, remarked, "I don't know what Greg (Costello) was doing up that far, I thought he was going to

get a nosebleed." Costello was usually a right-full, but

played in centre-midfield that day due to Gary Howlett's absence. He played 230 games for the Reds, winning two league titles and four FAI Cups.

Following the game, Shels held both the league title and FAI Cup for the first time ever. Unfortunately, the Reds has to wait seven more years to actually win the double, as a three--way playoff saw Cork City pip Shels and Bohs to the title.

Neville dismissed the suggestion that such a long wait for success in-

creased the pressure on the players. "I think we just acted as professio-

nals, you know?

"We knew the fans had waited a long time for any sort of success, and it was

important for us to give them that, but I don't think we felt the pressure.
"I remember '92 in particular, all of the other clubs and the media tried to pile the pressure on us and say 'ah Shels will bottle it', so after we did win it I said 'that's for all the doubters.

Then by '93, I suppose we had proven we could get over the line but we weren't necessarily favourites, because Dundalk had a very experienced team and we still had a few young lads like Mark (Rutherford) and Brian (Flood).

Mick continued to note that he noticed similar doubts surrounding the Reds' 2019 promotion-winning side.

"With a big club like Shels there's always going to be people out to get you and people who want you to fail, but the lads were professional last year and got the job done."

Neville, who is second only to Owen Heary in all-time appearances for Shelbourne, is in Tolka tonight to watch the Reds take on old rivals Dundalk once again.



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In the immediate aftermath of Shelbourne's 3-1 win over Drogheda United, the game that ended our exile from the top tier of Irish football, I found myself galloping aimlessly towards the centre circle, completely lost in the moment.

Sprinting onto the pitch with no particular purpose, I like every other Reds man and woman in the ground was completely overcome with emotion. It was a feeling like no other, call it elation, contentment, I don't know if words can adequately describe the serenity that came in that instance.

were hugs, there were kisses, and a fair share of tears. Shels fans have endured enough misery to last a lifetime, but in that instance it all seemed like a vague memory. The breakthrough had

finally come.

The new season began in the best possible way, a narrow but deserved 1-0 win over Cork City. That palpable positivity carried through the winter and followers of the fortunes of Shelbourne FC continue to carry it in abundance ahead of the first home

game of the season

In many ways last week's game reminded me of those frantic few minutes after the final whistle in Drogheda. I watched in the stands in Turners Cross a week ago as similar scenes played out, the handshakes, the embraces, hugs among friends who may not been together since the last game of the season, the respectful nod between the elder gents who have traveled the highways and byways for longer than they can remember.

Tonight is special in many ways, chief among them is that the optimism currently permeating the club is unencumbered by reality, our dreams are not punctured by results, the cynicism that afflicts even the most positive of football fans is keeping its powder dry for at least a month. Shelbourne fans

are enjoving themselves.

Since that magical night in Drogheda where Shelbourne clinched promotion back to the Premier Division of the SSE Airtricity League fans have been able to allow positivity to prevail. False dawns, near misses, robberies, and just plain rough luck, all now nothing more than a memory, brighter days are ahead for the Auld Reds, they began a week ago with the dream start on the road. Playing Cork City in Turners Cross, a world away from the first division, (thanks be to Jaysus). If I never see from, hear of, or watch Cabinteely play again it will be too soon.

After a period of stagnation, Shels are making progress. The visit of the champions Dundalk to Tolka Park is progress, as is a rise in season ticket sales, record breaking revenues from the shop and, this new programme, coming to the device of your choice.

the coming months is a mystery. If you do take away anything from this

column, please let it be this.

Whatever happens from tonight until the end of the season, try to find joy in it. Sitting alongside my brother tonight, watching the match with my mates, I'll be grateful. I feel lucky to see Shels back where we belong, to feel the emotions, for better or for worse, to live the ups and downs that come with following the fortunes of Shelbourne Football Club



CHECKING YOUR BREASTS

CHECK MONTHLY



One week after the end of your period is the best time. If menopausal, check on the same day every month.

LOOK FOR CHANGES



Stand in front of a mirror with your hands in the air. Look for changes in size or shape, puckering, dimpling or redness of the skin.

FEEL FOR CHANGES



Using your fingers, check for any lumps, thickening or bumps.

AREAS NOT TO FORGET



Gently squeeze the nipple to check for discharge.
Check your armpit as breast tissue also extends here.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND SOMETHING

Most breast changes are benign (non-cancerous) so if you do find something, don't panic. However, visit your GP without delay to be certain.

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Shelbourne **Football Club** Equality Procedure

The aim of this policy is to ensure that everyone is treated fairly, and with respect, and that Shelbourne Football Club is equally accessible to all.

Shelbourne Football Club is responsible for setting standards and values to apply throughout the club at every level. Football belongs to, and should be enjoyed by, anyone who wants to participate in it.

Our commitment is to confront and eliminate discrimination by reason of gender, sexual orientation, marital status, race, ethnic origin, religion or belief, ability or disability and to encourage equal opportunities.

The policy is fully supported by the club officers, who are responsible for the implementation of this policy.

Shelbourne Football Club in all its activities will not discriminate, or in any way treat anyone less favourably, on grounds of gender, sexual orientation, marital status, race, ethnic origin, colour, religion or belief, ability or disability. It means that Shelbourne Football Club will ensure that it treats people fairly and with respect and that it will provide access and opportunity to all members of the community to take part in, and enjoy, its activities.

Shelbourne Football Club will not tolerate harassment, bullying, abuse or victimisation of an individual, which for the purpose of this policy and the actions and sanctions applicable, is regarded as discrimination. This includes sexual or racial harassment or other discriminatory behaviour, whether physical or verbal. Shelbourne Football Club will work to ensure that such behaviour is met with appropriate action in whatever context it occurs.

Shelbourne Football Club is committed to a policy of equal treatment of all members and requires all members to abide by and adhere to the policies and requirements of the relevant legislation - Equal Status act 2000-2004, Employment Equality Act 1998 and 2004, Prohibition of Incitement to hatred Act 1989, as well as any amendment to these Acts and any later legislation.

Shelbourne Football club commits itself to the immediate investigation of any claims, when it is brought to its attention, of discrimination on the above grounds and where such is found to be the case, a requirement that the practice stop and sanctions imposed as appropriate.

SHELBOURNE FC STADIUM REGULATIONS

- 1. All persons entering this stadium are admitted subject to the following stadium regulations and rules of the club. Entry to the stadium shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of these rules and regulations and failure to comply, following admission, may result in ejection from the stadium.
- 2. Permission to enter and remain within the stadium, notwithstanding the possession of a ticket, is at the absolute discretion of Stadium Management, Stewards and An Garda Síochána.
- 3. Fireworks, Smoke Canisters, Bottles, Glasses, Cans, Flags, Banners, Poles, Laser pens, Flares, or any similar articles or containers, including anything that could be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the stadium. Any person in possession of such articles or containers, or who refuses to be searched by a member of an Garda Síochána or other authorised security personnel, may be refused entry or ejected from the stadium.
- 4. Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the stadium.
- 5. The unauthorised climbing of floodlight pylons, stands or any other building is forbidden.
- **6.** Any person found damaging or defacing the property of the club will be prosecuted.
- 7. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the field of play.
- 8. Unnecessary noise and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in the stadium.
- 9. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter the field of play at any time.
- 10. Any form of racist abuse, threatening behaviour and racist, homophobic, discriminatory or obscene chanting is strictly forbidden.
- 11. Religious or political advertising, banners and slogans are strictly prohibited.
- 12. Any person who remains in a gangway or passage may be ejected from the stadium.
- 13. The moving from one area of the stadium to another without the permission of a steward, an Garda Síochana or other authorised agents of the club is strictly forbidden.
- **14.** Sale or distribution of publications or other items inside the stadium without written permission is strictly forbidden.
- 15. In the event of a match being postponed or abandoned, any refund of the admission charge will be at the sole discretion the club management.
- 16. Children under 14 are admitted only when accompanied and supervised by an adult.
- 17. Liability for loss, injury or damage to persons or property in and around the stadium is excluded to the maximum extent permissible by law.

Safety Notice

Shelbourne FC is committed to ensuring the safety of all supporters on match day. The Club would be grateful for you co-operation with regard to the following points:

There are a number of exits from the ground at Tolka Park. In the interests of safety, please take the time to acquaint yourself with the exit nearest to you. If an emergency necessitates the evacuation of the ground, patrons should proceed to the nearest exit and not re-enter the ground under any circumstances.

If you require medical assistance, contact the Order of Malta attendant or the First Aid Room - where medical assistance will be available.


Parents re asked to ensure that children are supervised in the ground at all times.


